Before Your First Visit

Please allow enough travel time to get safely and comfortably to your appointments on time. Maps and information on directions, parking, public transportation, clinic locations, food service and lodging can be found in the inserts in the front flap of this guide – and are also available digitally at **health.ucsd.edu/cancer**.

Your First Appointment

When getting ready for your first appointment, you may feel anxious and overwhelmed. This is completely normal and we are here to support you. Below is information about what to bring, how to communicate effectively with your team, and helpful tips to make your visit go as smoothly as possible.

What to Bring:

- Photo ID and insurance information
- Your health insurance card(s), including Medicare or Medi-Cal cards
- □ Any co-payment required by your insurance
- Name and contact information of your primary care physician (PCP) and any other physicians involved in your health care
- Written lists (or bottles) of the medications you are taking, both prescribed and over-the-



counter, including vitamins, supplements and herbal remedies

- Information about your medical history
- Notebook for you or a loved one to take notes

Communication Tips

MyUCSDChart

UC San Diego Health offers MyUCSDChart, a personalized and secure online tool to make communication with your care team easier.

With MyUCSDChart, you can send secure messages to your care team, view test results, view your current list of medications, request prescription referrals, receive health care reminders, request non-urgent appointments, secure portions of your medical records and much more.



Helpful Advice From Your Care Team and Other Patients

- Dress in comfortable clothes and bring a sweater or jacket.
- Southern California traffic can sometimes be difficult. Give yourself plenty of time to get to your appointment, find parking and make your way to the clinic location for your appointment.
- Always check in at the registration desk prior to your appointment. The registration staff will direct you to the appropriate clinical department.
- Bring a family member, loved one or friend with you for support, and to listen and take notes during your appointment, so that you can review the information together afterward.
- Interpreting and translation services, as well as services for individuals who are hearing impaired, are available. Please inform our scheduling staff if you require these services.
- Do not bring children to your appointment for everyone's safety.

Comprehensive Cancer Services and Care Teams

Cancer is treated in multiple ways. Some of the most common types of treatment include:

- Surgery, which involves removing the cancer cells
- Chemotherapy, which uses medications to destroy cancer cells that may be circulating in the body
- Radiation therapy, which uses high-energy particles to wipe out cancer cells
- Immunotherapy, which uses the body's own immune system to find and destroy cancer cells
- Targeted therapy, which targets specific characteristics of cancer cells to block their growth and spread
- Supportive therapy, which involves evaluating and treating both cancer and side effects related to cancer therapy

A patient's care plan may include one or more of these treatments, as well as others not listed above. As our understanding of cancer improves, new emerging treatments become available to patients.

UC San Diego Health uses a multidisciplinary care team approach with comprehensive services to ensure that you receive the best possible treatment.

Multidisciplinary Care Team

Each member of your multidisciplinary care team, with their passion for taking exceptional care of patients and their loved ones, plays an integral role in your cancer care.

Physicians

Physicians (MDs) are oncologists, surgeons and other medical doctors who direct your care. In addition to your primary doctor, called an attending physician, you may receive care from:

- Fellows, who are licensed physicians with specialized oncology training who are furthering their expertise in an oncology subspecialty
- Residents, who are licensed physicians completing additional specialty training in oncology
- Medical students, who may accompany cancer care team members as part of their education



Nurse Practitioners/Physician Assistants

Nurse practitioners (NPs) and physician assistants (PAs) have advanced medical degrees and share responsibility with your doctor for your overall treatment plan and care. They will help develop the care plan, conduct physical examinations, order medications and tests, and assist in managing your symptoms or side effects from treatment.

Registered Nurses

Registered nurses (RNs) work with you and your loved ones to assess your condition, advocate for your care, provide education, answer questions and coordinate treatments across your entire care team.

Licensed Vocational Nurses

Licensed vocational nurses (LVNs) work with you and your loved ones to ensure your questions are answered and assist with obtaining the documents or resources you need.

Medical Assistants

Medical assistants help with many aspects of care, including measuring vital signs, helping with procedures and providing paperwork or other resources. Medical assistants can also help you feel more comfortable while you wait in the exam room by bringing you a cup of water, a blanket or crackers. They can also inform you of your expected wait time.

Licensed Clinical Social Workers

Licensed clinical social workers (LCSWs) can assist you and your loved ones with psychological, social, emotional, spiritual and practical needs. Social workers can help with issues such as coping with treatment, caregiving information and resources, connecting with community support, understanding disability and medical leave planning, and managing financial concerns. There is no cost for their services.

Patient Navigators

Patient navigators provide personalized support to you and your loved ones from the first visit through survivorship care. They serve as a single point of contact to answer your nonmedical questions, orient you and your families to cancer services and help you navigate UC San Diego Health.

Pharmacists

Pharmacists are experts in cancer drugs and other related medications and can provide you with specialized prescription-related counseling at no cost. They can also help you monitor your prescriptions to ensure safety. Our retail pharmacy offers a full prescription-filling service and many common over-the-counter medications.

Dietitians

Nutrition is an important part of your treatment and recovery. Eating the right kinds of foods and



optimizing your nutrition intake can help you feel better and stay stronger. A registered dietitian can work with you to create a nutrition plan that meets your specific needs. Cost: Most insurance carriers will reimburse for a consultation with a registered dietician when referred by a physician.

Administrative Assistants

Administrative assistants (AAs) answer phones, schedule appointments and assist with other administrative tasks.

Our goal is to provide you with billing guidance during your cancer treatment. We recognize that you may have questions regarding your insurance coverage and paying for your medical bills. Center for Integrative Medicine

UC San Diego Health partners with UC San Diego School of Medicine's Center for Integrative Medicine to offer you integrative therapies. Clinical Trials Office

A clinical trial is a research study conducted with volunteer participants, usually to evaluate if a new treatment is safe and effective. Because UC San Diego Health physician-scientists at the Clinical Trials Office investigate new drugs, surgical procedures and therapy combinations, you have access to some of the most advanced treatments. Our clinical trials team is dedicated to educating patients about clinical trials and helping you to access research treatments before they are widely available. When patients are enrolled in a clinical trial, they will work closely with a Clinical Trials Coordinator to help them navigate their way through the clinical trial. Please ask a member of your cancer team about clinical trials that may be available. If you have questions about Clinical Trials please call 858-822-5354 for assistance.

Financial Counseling

If you have questions or concerns about paying for your care and medications, please call **858-822-7969**, 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., Monday – Friday for assistance with:

Genetic Counseling

Our genetic counselors specialize in helping you and your loved ones understand health risks in families. They also provide education about genetic testing, early disease detection, supportive resources and research opportunities.

Speak to a member of your core cancer care team for more information and a referral. Cost: Usually covered by most insurers, but contact your insurance company in advance to determine coverage.

Imaging Services

Your physician may use imaging technologies to see how well your bones, organs and tissues are functioning. Our Imaging Services department uses state-of-the-art technology, including positron emission tomography (PET), computerized tomography (CT) and magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) to pinpoint and map tumors so that your doctor can treat cancer cells. Imaging Services also offers all-digital breast imaging, diagnostic mammography, breast ultrasound and bone densitometry (DEXA).

Medical Interpretation

At UC San Diego Health, clear communication is important in providing outstanding care for all our patients in our diverse community. We provide interpretive services in several languages onsite or via phone or remote video so that you can comfortably discuss your medical needs with your doctor in your preferred language. You can request our interpreting services if:

- Your preferred language is not English
- · You have hearing loss or speech difficulties
- You communicate in American Sign Language (ASL)

Palliative Care

The goal of palliative care is to improve the quality of life of those with serious illnesses, such as cancer. It is different from hospice care or endof-life care. Although all of these types of care do focus on comfort and support, palliative care often begins at diagnosis and continues during treatment and beyond.

Palliative care is sometimes called "supportive care" because it aims to prevent or treat a disease's symptoms and its treatment and side effects as early as possible. Palliative care also addresses emotional and spiritual issues.

Palliative care does not mean that you have to give up any other medications or treatments. Our palliative care providers work with your core cancer care team to help you achieve your best quality of life throughout treatment. You will continue to receive care from your core cancer care team.

Psychology and Psychiatry

Psychologists and psychiatrists play key roles in helping you and your loved ones through your cancer experience, treatment and survivorship. Cancer and its treatment side effects can make it difficult to cope with everyday life or lead to additional stresses such as insomnia, depression or anxiety. Our psychologists and psychiatrists are available by referral and can assist you with the appropriate treatments. Our support team offers:

- Comprehensive assessment of needs and concerns
- Individual, couples or family counseling focused on coping with cancer
- Consultation and medication treatment

Some of these services require prior insurance authorization.

Rehabilitation (Physical, Occupational, Speech Therapy)

UC San Diego Health offers a full range of physical, occupational and speech therapy. We can do an evaluation and customize our services to your individual needs. The goals are to minimize pain, restore function, and promote adaptation to improve quality of life. Our experienced therapists have specialized training that ensures the best treatment options based on the most current research in the field.

Reproductive Health Services

At UC San Diego Health we believe reproductive health care is important for every young cancer patient at every stage of the care journey. Reproductive health issues – including the ability to have healthy pregnancies and children, prevent unintended pregnancies and manage menopause or testicular failure – are all important to young cancer survivors. Both female and male patients facing cancer therapy have effective options to preserve their fertility. Ask your care team for more information.

Speech Pathology

Our speech pathologists help care for those with complex disorders of the voice and swallowing systems. Our team offers a wide range of stateof-the-art surgical and behavioral therapy options to help restore and optimize the ability to talk, eat and breathe. They can address voice, swallowing or feeding disorders and create a diagnostic and therapeutic plan for your specific needs. Please speak with your cancer care team for a referral and more information.

Spiritual Care, Counseling and Chaplaincy

Spiritual care can provide an important source of comfort and strength to patients and families faced with serious illnesses or difficult decisions to make. Our spiritual care team includes chaplains and volunteer spiritual leaders from many different faiths. Together, they provide compassionate and caring spiritual support to patients and their families. Different beliefs, cultures and values are respected.

What You Can Do Through MyUCSDChart

- View upcoming visits and check in for your appointments
- Request and view your medical records
- See your medications and request prescription refills or renewals to be sent to a pharmacy
- Message your provider with your non-urgent health-related questions
- Request an e-visit or contact your physician about specific medical concerns such as concerns over new symptoms, side effects from a prescribed medication, or requests to switch medications covered by insurance.
 Note: A charge for an e-visit will only be applied to the MyUCSDChart message that includes medical evaluation and management by your provider.

- View your upcoming tests and procedures
- See your blood work and other test results
- Review your vaccinations/immunizations
- Pay your medical bills
- · Conduct a video visit with a provider
- Share your health information
- Get real-time updates about your hospital stay, including medication information, care team profiles, lab results and more

Telemedicine

Telemedicine is the use of telecommunications technology, often a cell phone, laptop computer, tablet, or another medical device to provide health care or connect with your health care provider without the inconvenience of having to travel to a clinic. You can conduct video visits with your health care providers from home, work or another convenient location on your cellphone or tablet. This doesn't replace the doctor-patient relationship but supports and enhances it.

Examples of telemedicine services include your online appointments, including those with physicians or for nutrition services, social work, palliative care, spiritual care or psychosocial care. Other online services include remote monitoring of various health conditions you may have, messaging your doctor through MyUCSDChart, watching an online video sent by your provider before a procedure, and getting email, cellphone or text reminders about medical appointments.

In addition, you may be able to access supportive care services remotely, including the classes and services discussed in the next section, Patient & Family Support Groups, Classes and Resources.

Your virtual appointments are private, secure and convenient. To make a virtual appointment, go online to **MyUCSDChart.ucsd.edu** or call your provider's office.

Additional Resources

Patient and Family Resource Center

Patient and Family Resource Centers are open in outpatient oncology service locations to all community members seeking accurate information about cancer and related diseases. The centers, designed with your needs in mind, are comfortable, peaceful environments staffed by well-trained volunteers, many of whom are cancer survivors. We offer a variety of resources in various languages, including free brochures, a lending library of books. Computers, scanners and printers are available for you to use, and our volunteers will gladly assist with accessing the most up-to-date cancer information and community resources.

Smoking Cessation

Kick It California, a partnership between researchers at UC San Diego Health and the California Department of Health, offers phone counseling and other free services, including supportive text messaging and self-help materials. You may qualify for free nicotine patches. Studies show that smokers who use this kind of counseling are twice as likely to quit as those who don't. Call **800-300-8086** to choose from a range of services to help you reach your goal.

Child Life Specialists

Teen and young adult patients facing a cancer diagnosis, as well as children of adult patients who are navigating their parent's serious illness, face unique challenges.

Our certified child life specialists use therapeutic play and expressive arts, developmentally appropriate education, family resources and memory-making interventions to support you and your family through all phases of your cancer journey. Healing Garden of Hope

On the west side of the Moores Cancer Center, outside the windows of the Garden Infusion Center, is the Healing Garden of Hope. Patients and their loved ones can enjoy nature while they are receiving treatment – either from inside the infusion center or, if possible, in the garden. Along with comfortable seating and shade, the garden features flowering plants that lack strong fragrances and thorns and don't attract bees.



Directions, Parking & Public Transportation

Food Service, Lodging & Discounted Hotels

Food Services: Food services are available at most locations. Please ask a care team member for more information.

Lodging: Family Houses at UC San Diego Health, including Bannister Family House in Hillcrest and the La Jolla Family House, are available to your family members and support persons if you are being treated at UC San Diego Health. Guests must live at least 65 miles from the hospital and stay a minimum of three nights.

In some cases, if you have been discharged but still need to be near the hospital, you may move into the house, space permitting. There are no medical services provided at the Family Houses, so a caregiver, friend or loved one must stay with you. Priority is given to life-threatening circumstances, as opposed to procedural surgeries or diagnostic testing.




